At the Heights, Burnley we work on phonics throughout the KS1-3 curriculum in line with the individual's needs.

We achieve progression for the students by following the following principles:

- 1. Start with the basics: Before beginning to read, children should be familiar with the sounds of each letter and how they blend together to form words. This can be achieved through the use of the Read, Write Inc. phonics program, which focuses on teaching children the sounds of each letter and how they can be blended together to form words.
- 2. Build on the basics: Once children have a good understanding of the sounds of each letter, it is important to build on this foundation by introducing them to more complex words and phrases. This can be achieved by using the Read, Write Inc phonics program to teach children how to blend sounds together to form more complex words, and then gradually introducing them to more challenging phrases.
- 3. Practice, practice, practice: The key to success when it comes to reading at key stage 1 is practice. Children should be given plenty of opportunities to practice their reading skills, both individually and in small groups. This can be achieved by using the Read, Write Inc phonics program to provide children with regular reading practice, as well as through the use of games and activities that encourage children to read and write.
